1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

The College accommodates thousands of first generation learners from the economically backward section of the rural/ semi-rural population. The College tries to attract students from the minority community as far as possible. The College endeavors to inculcate communal harmony among the learners. The College achieved the status of an undergraduate College in 1959. The main campus comprises the Main Building, Science Building, B.Ed Building, Boys' Common Room, Girls' Common Room, Canteen, Administrative Building and a Post Office. The second campus holds the Girls' Hostel, Principal's Quarter and Teaching Staff quarters. On the third campus stands the Boys' Hostel. The Sports Ground of the College forms the fourth campus of the College.

At the outset, the College was affiliated to Calcutta University until Burdwan University was established on 16th June 1960. The College was included into 2(f) and 12(b) categories under UGC Act 1956 in the year 1959. The College enjoys Grant-in-Aid financial status under the Government of West Bengal.

The College sporadically suffered from an acute staff shortage, both of teaching and non-teaching staff. The College has tried to address the crisis by employing Govt.-Approved Part-timers and Contractual lecturers and also by recruiting temporary teachers as and when required.

Vision

The vision of the College gradually changed with time, especially with spreading literacy mission all over West Bengal. The College tries to attract students from the minority community as far as possible. This is more important in the case of girls from the minority, who are admitted to the Morning section of the College which exclusively serves girls. The College endeavours to inculcate communal harmony among the learners by convening Saraswati puja as well as observing Navi Diwas.

The College adopts an *inclusive* approach through expanding the scope of education to farther areas beyond the immediate rural belt surrounding the townships. Thus the College ventured to accommodate students from as many as the four districts, to acknowledge the collective aspiration of the prospective students from this rural belt for social identity. Simultaneously the College allows special assistance to the SC/ST and minority students. The rise in the numbers of the first generation learners became a salient feature in the rural belt mentioned earlier. This resulted in continual rise in the intake of students in the College. The College was doing its best to cater higher education to this increasing mass of aspiring students.

Mission

The mission of college is 'Advancement of Learning'- the method followed to achieve the supreme good for oneself. Here in this college, the goal is to serve the students, mostly as they are, coming from economically, socially, and educationally constrained circumstances by providing them quality education by:

- (i) Exposing young minds to advanced scientific topics and imparting hands-on training with sophisticated analytical instruments
- (ii) To establish the college as a potential centre of research activities thus creating a strong tradition of deeprooted academic culture and an ambience that favours the scholarly activities of the faculty.
- (iii) Imparting a character-building education by a balanced development of the body (physical) and soul (spiritual) so that the students may turn out to be wise citizens able to shoulder the responsibility of the Nation.
- (iv) Developing a culture of labour and service, focus and perseverance, simple living and high thinking is transmitted to the students who are the future of the nation.

Institutional Strength

- The College has a vast landed area.
- Uninterrupted supply of safe drinking water, power and internet/wi-fi is available in the campus.
- The College has low-cost hostel facilities for both boys and girls.

- The Institution has its own staff quarters for its faculties.
- The Institution is well connected by road and railways.
- The NSS and NCC units carry out rural extension work on a regular basis.
- The College has its own playground.
- The Institution has a medicinal plant garden.
- The College offers Science subjects (both Honors & General courses) to the students.
- The College also runs a Govt.-aided B.Ed. department.
- The College has an exclusive Morning section for girls.
- The College publishes a peer reviewed double blinded international research journal named *International Journal of Research on Social and Natural Sciences* and multilingual academic journal called *String* twice a year.
- The College motivates its teachers to take up research and MRPs and act as co-guides supervising doctoral works.
- There is a cordial relationship and good integrity among the stakeholders of the Institution.

- The College has sent a prayer to the State Govt. to create posts for full-time faculties in both the Day and the Morning shifts.
- The College aspires to build a separate building for the Central Library and an auditorium.
- The College has an agreement with State Bank of India to set up an E-Corner inside the campus. It is yet to be set up.
- The Institution aims to set up ICT-enabled classrooms for the students.
- The College proposes to augment the built-up area.
- The College also seeks to create an indoor-games complex.
- Creating awareness, advocating/transfer of relative findings of research of the institution and elsewhere to students and community (lab to land).

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The vision of the College is to spread quality education among students aspiring for a good future. The College also tries to provide education to learners belonging to backward classes and weaker economic sections of the society. The College strives to empower the students beyond the syllabi through various activities of the NSS and NCC.

- The prospectus provides all information that a student needs.
- The College offers Honours in a number of subjects in Arts, Science and Commerce stream. The Honours subjects are teamed up with several General subjects. Apart from these, every learner has to study Compulsory Bengali, Compulsory English and Environmental Science during the 3yr course.
- The College does not enjoy any academic autonomy since it is affiliated to the University of Burdwan.
- The College suffers from a very low teacher-student ratio. However, very recently, after the new Principal joined the College, the 100 Point Roster has been rectified by BCW, Govt. of West Bengal, and the vacant posts are gradually being filled up. Eight new posts have also been created in the B.Ed department.
- Test examination is organised for Part I and Part II students who are going to sit for University examinations. Apart from this, class tests are conducted by the teachers to monitor the progress of the students from time to time.
- All academic activities are monitored by the Principal, IQAC and the Teachers' Council.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

- Publicity of admission to the College is done through notification on College notice board and official website.
- The College publishes single merit lists for admission of students to the academic sessions for the last eight consecutive years. In the early phases it was offline admission but in 2013-14 B.U. conducted a central online admission process and from 2015-16 the College itself is running an online admission process to ensure utmost transparency.
- The College strictly follows the reservation policy of the Govt. of West Bengal.
- Full or partial free ships are provided to economically backward students who are at the risk of dropout.
- Faculties use lecture method as well as modern methods like PPT for teaching.
- Evaluation of the students is done primarily through class-tests throughout the academic sessions apart from holding annual Test examinations.
- The faculties constantly improve their knowledge and skills by attending seminars, refresher courses, conferences, workshops, Orientation Programs, Faculty Development programs, and also through research activities.
- The College Library provides books and journals to both students and teachers. The College is also a member of N-LIST.
- Teachers try to satisfy the learners both inside and outside the classrooms.

Research, Innovations and Extension

• The College has a research to facilitates research activities.

- The College publishes a double blind peer reviewed international research journal named 'International Journal of Research on Social and Natural Sciences' and has a separate web address assigned to it, www.katwacollegejournal.com. The College also publishes a multilingual academic journal named 'String'.
- Teachers regularly carry on research and publish articles, present papers in seminars conferences etc.
- During the last four years Six (06) Faculties have completed their Ph.D. work.
- A few of the Faculties act as co-guides supervising doctoral work.
- Quite a few of the Faculties hold life memberships of different academic associations/organizations/bodies.
- IQAC has conducted numerous seminars on various subjects. Student seminars are organised too from time to time.
- From time to time they are assigned project works related to their curricula.
- Books from the library are readily available to both students and teachers for carrying out any research.
- Since the College is not a research centre no budgetary allocations can be made for research.
- The College is not involved in any kind of consultancy either.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

- The College offers a viable infrastructure and learning resources for the learners as well as for the Faculty.
- The College provides class rooms, ICT rooms, library, laboratories, Day and Morning Office (including Principal's office), IQAC chamber, NSS office, NCC office, Students' Union office, separate common rooms for boys and girls, multi-gym and playground.
- The office is fully computerized and all works related to students and teachers are done through computers.
- Each department is provided with at least one computer with internet connection.
- The College provides uninterrupted supply of power and safe drinking water.
- The College houses a canteen that caters to the students and the employees.
- The College provides separate hostels for boys and girls.
- The College has separate libraries for the Morning, the Day and the B.Ed. section/s. The Day section Library is under the process of digitization and update of the database. The Library has both lending and reading sections.
- The College has ramps and wheelchairs for physically challenged students.
- The academic campus of the College is constantly kept under CCTV surveillance.
- The College has its own dynamic website under the address: www.katwaCollege.ac.in
- With a goal to make a paperless office, new College Administrative Management Software (CAMS) has been recently introduced.
- The College has taken an initiative for E-tendering system in association with Govt. of West Bengal (e-Mudhra).

Student Support and Progression

- The College website, <u>www.katwacollege.ac</u>.in provides all relevant information to the various stakeholders.
- The College publishes updated prospectus every year for the benefit of the students.
- The students of reserved categories are provided reservation according to the rules of Govt. of West

Bengal.

- The College has a tie-up with Students' Health Home which provides free treatment to the students.
- The College has Internal Complaints Committee, Anti-Ragging Committee, and Grievance Redressal Cell for assistance of the learners.
- The College houses a canteen that caters to the students.
- Election to the Students' Union is conducted on a regular basis.
- Various rural extension activities are carried out through NSS.
- The members of NCC from the College are part of NCC Battalion 1/54.
- The College holds Remedial Coaching for SC/ST, minority and OBC students.
- Students' Counseling programmes are held in collaboration with the District Employment Exchange.
- Students are encouraged by the faculties for appearing in various competitive examinations like JAM.
- The College offers a steady support to its students toward participation in different sports events organised by the University and the other sports bodies.

Governance, Leadership and Management

- The Governing Body is at the apex of College administration and it is primarily a policy-making institution.
- The Principal and IQAC look after day to day work of the College and provide able leadership to the same.

- The institution works on the participative and democratic principles of Management and frames all its plans in consultation with the Governing Body, I.Q.A.C., Teachers' Council and other committees. Academic issues are addressed through open discussion in the Teachers' Council.

- Expenditure for the College is done in a proper procedure through a Purchase Committee and detailed account is maintained for all expenditures.

- The Institution strictly preserves the green environment and conducts green audit.
- Regular plantation programs are organised.
- The College adopted online admission process from the session 2015-16.
- The College encourages faculties to take up Research work and MRPs. Minor Research projects.
- Teachers use modern teaching aids such as PPT and Multimedia to make the teaching-learning process more effective.
- The faculties who teach in under-graduate classes grade themselves by being academically engaged in research. Therefore, the College relentlessly encourages its teachers to take up research works in the form of doctoral thesis, Major and Minor Research Projects.
- One of the major objectives of the College is to prepare students as responsible citizens, apart from their academic development. This is performed by the College through one of NSS units' most important work blood collection twice a year and Blood Donation Motivation Course offered by the University of Burdwan. The NSS has introduced a University level Certificate Course for Blood Donation for NSS volunteers and others.

• The objective to prepare students as responsible citizens apart from their academic development is also achieved through the work done by the NCC unit of the College.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

Response:

- The Institution is aware of making the learners conscious of these issues. The issues of Gender and Environment are also incorporated within the syllabi. According to CBCS, all students of both Honours and General courses have to study
- Environmental Science in their 1st semester. All students of 1+1+1 system study Environmental Studies in the third year of their course. The College follows the curriculum set up by the affiliating University. The University has modernized its curriculum through Choice Based Credit System and its concern for gender sensitisation is reflected in the syllabi of subjects like English, Philosophy and History. Environment and sustainability is a major concern at present and incorporated in the syllabus which is taught to all students of Honours and General courses.

- English The syllabus deals with gender issues in the 5th semester. Paper CC XI has a topic on Women's writing which comprises The Confessional Mode in Women's Writing, Sexual Politics, Race, Caste and Gender, Social Reform and Women's Rights.
- One GE paper in the same semester contains a topic on Contemporary India: Women and Empowerment.
- **Philosophy** The syllabus deals with the same in 3rd semester, Paper CC 6 proposes to introduce Applied Ethics on Gender Equality.
- **History** Gender issues are dealt with in the Paper II of DSE course 5th semester. The topic is Life & Culture in Bengal Changes in the 20th Century Changing Role of Women.
- The alternative to the same paper contains History of USA Women's Rights, Afro-American Women
- Political Science in the old system has a topic on Feminism: Meaning, significance, different schools in Paper VI.
- The College has organised seminar on Gender Sensitization, Human Rights and Arctic Biology in the session 2016-2017.
- The IQAC Co-coordinator has formed a Gender Sensitization Committee with the lady teachers that will work for more awareness on gender issues and provide counseling facilities to the female students.

- There is no formal mechanism at the institutional level to identify advanced learners or slow learners as such. However, class tests and unit tests are organised to gauge the capability of the students. Nevertheless, the classroom environment helps the faculty members to identify such students from their respective responses on topic-wise discussions. In fact these discussions prove to be more helpful in identifying the advanced learners than the established routine methods like class tests, unit tests, or results in University exams etc. Students taking active part in these discussions raise questions and issues, and are always encouraged to think independently and with more coherence.
- Teachers take special care to engage them in further discussions outside the classroom to make them feel confident of their intelligence and capability. The teachers also identify slow learners and take pains to address their issues outside the classroom, as far as possible at personal levels too.
- Remedial coaching is provided to the poor learners.

- The College is ever striving to make learning student-centric. The teachers act as facilitators and introduce the topic to the students. Teachers encourage the students to ask questions in order to have better understanding of the subject at hand. Class room debates are also conducted by the teachers to encourage thinking and questioning.
- Classrooms are turned into living laboratories in the truest sense of the word where students are seen as equal participants. The give and take engendered by such an atmosphere helps in developing the critical and creative thinking skills of both the students and the teachers.

- Teachers hold regular class tests to gauge the progress of the students and take remedial measures where necessary.
- Tutorial classes are arranged for academically trailing students in some departments
- Students are provided with study materials.
- Students are supplied with a list of books they need to consult for their course.
- Students are encouraged to consult teachers outside class for any clarification of various topics discussed in class. The students often seek teachers' help in personal matters too.
- PPT and Multi-media are used for assisting teaching method in some Departments.
- Teachers enjoy free access to internet; reference books from the Library which helps them in enriching their study materials that are given to the students and in turn ultimately benefits the students.
- Academic counseling is done by teachers with empathy for slow learners to boost them up and to realize the basic problem or root cause of their poor performance.

- Part-II & Part-III Honours students are encouraged for rendering seminar lectures on specialized

topics in some departments.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Reforms in Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level

Response:

- Class tests and test examinations before the finals are held to gauge the improvement made by the learners in their field of study in the 1+1+1 system.
- The affiliating University has introduced Choice Based Credit System on the basis of semesters from the session 2017-2018 onwards. Internal evaluation of the students in all subjects by the teachers is mandatory under this system since marks obtained in these internal tests are to be added to the marks of University examination held at the end of the semester. The internal evaluation of students can have three forms, viz. class test, seminar presentation or assignment.

• This is the only institution within the sub-division that offers Honours course in six Pure Science and Bio Science subjects. Honours in eight subjects are offered in Humanities along with General course in all of them. A huge number of students are admitted to the general Course. Therefore, continuous internal tests can be held for Honours students only as the teacher-student ratio is not promising at all.

2.5.2 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and variety

Response:

Internal assessment is an integral part of teaching-learning and evaluation process.

All evaluated answer papers are shown to the students for improvement and transparency. At least two internal tests are held during the semester before the examination is held at the end of the semester apart from class tests organised for continuous improvement.

In case of 1+1+1 system, test examinations are held before the students appear for final examination. Nevertheless sincere students who attend classes regularly sit for class tests held by individual teachers.

2.5.3 Mechanism to deal with examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient

Response:

- At College level, the student may bring to notice of the teacher concerned. If the grievance is still not redressed he/she may register a complaint with the Head of the Department. He/she may go to the Principal if the issue remains unaddressed even after that.
- In case of class tests all grievances are mitigated by the respective teacher.
- At University level, the student may go for post result publication scrutiny and review

2.5.4 The institution adheres to the academic calendar for the conduct of CIE

At least two internal tests are held during the semester as introduced under Choice Based Credit System before the final examination is held at the end of the semester. Criterion 4 - Infrastructure and Learning Resources

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 The institution has adequate facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment, etc.

Response:

- The College buildings are optimally used to allot classrooms, laboratories, libraries, separate common rooms for boys & girls, Administrative office, NSS Office, NCC Office, gymnasium, store and canteen. The College, in fact suffers from space crunch at the moment.
- The College has separate hostels for boys and girls which cater to the needs of learners coming from far off areas and financially underprivileged sections.
- All of departments in the College have desktops and/or laptops for use of the faculty. The College has numerous printers and four stand alone machines.
- The greenery in the main Campus in preserved with care so that an ecological balance may be maintained in the area. There is one medicinal plant garden and two floral gardens inside the Campus which help the environment as well as serve the students of the Department of Botany.
- The College ensures uninterrupted power supply for the learners through the use of a noiseless generator. The College also provides safe drinking water to the students all through the day.

4.1.2 The institution has adequate facilities for sports, games (indoor, outdoor),gymnasium, yoga centre etc., and cultural activities

Response:

Sports Activities

- The College has a separate sports ground for Annual Sports. Prize and certificates are presented to all students acquiring the first three positions in each item.
- There is a sports ground adjacent to the Boys' Hostel which serve the boarders of the hostel. Another sports ground inside the quarter campus is used by the dwellers.
- Indoor games are held throughout the year. Competitions for the students are arranged in Carom, Table Tennis and Chess.
- The College has sent a proposal of Rs. 1900000/- Sports dept of WB govt. to build an indoor sports complex.
- A multigym was opened in the session 2016-2017 with the financial help from the Youth Welfare Department of the Government of West Bengal. The multigym was inaugurated by two former national footballers. This gymnasium is patronized by the Government Nominee of the Governing Body of Katwa College and is used by the students and the faculty.
- There is a separate sports and games office cum store room inside the campus. Stock register is regularly maintained by the Sports-in-Charge regarding the various sports equipments.
- Students are provided with sports equipments for regular practice.
- Students are occasionally provided coaching for different games.

Criterion 6 - Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 The governance of the institution is reflective of an effective leadership in tune with the vision and mission of the institution

- The **Vision** of the College at the outset, a year after India's Independence, was to spread education in a semi-rural *agro-based* area which did not have a single higher educational institution within about 50 kms. Later an exclusive girls' section (Morning section) was opened to bestow education on girls coming from relatively conservative background. The rural extension work of the College is carried out by the student members of National Service Scheme of Katwa College (4 units). Katwa is a small town in Burdwan district of West Bengal, surrounded by an extensive agrarian area. A huge population migrated to Katwa during Partition in 1947, and again in the period 1969 To1971. The College, located in the town, situated on the border of four districts, viz. Burdwan, Nadia, Birbhum and Murshidabad, today accommodates thousands of first generation learners from the economically backward section of the rural/semi-rural population. The only College in the subdivision to offer Honours in Science stream, the College offers Honours course in Arts stream in various subjects as well in Commerce stream. There is a considerable minority population in the districts referred to above. Possible. The College endeavours to inculcate communal harmony among the learners by convening Saraswati puja as well as observing Navi Diwas.
- The **Mission** of the College at the onset was to provide quality education to its students. However due to The affiliation to the University of Burdwan, the College does not have any power to introduce any course or programme without prior approval from the University. So the College has to operate within the curriculum and the examination format set up by the University. There is little scope for hybrid courses like bio-chemistry, industrial management in a semi-rural area like Katwa subdivision. Moreover, the University does not offer any such courses.
- The **Philosophy** of the Institution is to encourage collaborative management among the various stakeholders like students, teaching & non-teaching staff, alumni and guardians of the students. Therefore, representatives from all these sections are incorporated at different levels of management of the College.
- At the apex of management is the Governing Body of which three teaching and two non-teaching staff are members. The Principal is the Secretary of the Governing Body and President of the Teachers' Council (of which all permanent teachers are members) and thus he acts as a liaison between the two bodies. All academic decisions are made by the Teachers' Council as a whole and the IQAC. Permanent faculty, alumni, guardians, General Secretary of the Students' Union, eminent persons of the neighbourhood are members of IQAC which guides the teachers as well as the authority on the academic and other performances of the College.
- Previously, the College did not set up budget for the sessions. However, budgets have been

prepared for the last two sessions for the major expenses all round the year. Expenditure is also made on need basis in case of emergency.

6.1.2 The institution practices decentralization and participative management

Response:

The authority tries to involve the various bodies in pursuing the management of the College. A very successful instance of such participation was the formation of a new routine for the College on the eve of introduction of Choice Based Credit System in the UG Course from the session 2017-2018. It was decided by the Governing Body in its meeting that the Routine Committee along with the IQAC Coordinator should sit together and formulate the routine for Humanities, Science & Commerce stream. The routine was prepared by them and the IQAC Coordinator sent the routine to all Head of Departments via email for their feedback. Then the Principal met all Head of the Departments, Routine Committee and the IQAC Coordinator regarding the new routine. The routine was approved in this meeting and the feedback was sent back to the Governing Body for final ratification.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 Perspective/Strategic plan and Deployment documents are available in the institution

- The quality policy of the College is reflected in its vision and mission. The College continuously strives to assure quality in all its activities and encourages girl students through quality education. It offers financial support to students, better infrastructure facilities from time to time and introduces innovative teaching and learning methods. Internal Academic Audit Committee conducts regular audit to determine the standard of academic activities for quality assurance. The Institution regularly revises the academic performances, semester examination result, and percentage of success in examinations. The responsibility of continuous quality development is entrusted with the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC). Efforts are being continuously initiated to afford and fulfil the need.
- The long term strategic plan adopted by the apex body of the College along with the Building Committee to effectively address the demands and expectations of the different stakeholders of the Institution are as follows:

- The College releases the salary for its employees on the 1st of every month. The College pays the salary from the College Fund in case the grant from the State Government is delayed and the money is later reimbursed.
- The College employees established a credit cooperative in February 1989 called Katwa College Employees' Credit Cooperative Society. The Society offers Short Term, Middle Term, medical, house-building and Personal loan on first-come-first serve basis as well as need basis.
- The staff of the College is covered under Group Insurance Scheme. A festival advance is bestowed upon all the employees, both permanent and casual, before Puja vacation which is recovered later on from the salary without any interest.
- The College organizes Provident Fund loan for its employees as early as possible on need basis.
- The College provides quarters for its permanent teaching staff and librarians. However, all of them cannot be accommodated in the quarters as the number of quarters is only 26.
- College provides free Wi Fi and Internet facilities to teachers, non-teaching staff and students.
- The College authority has initiated a practice of felicitating the retired staff.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes

- The IQAC was established in the Institution in 2008. However, the actual work of IQAC was started when it was reformed in October 2014.
- The IQAC decided in its meeting that seminars are needed to be organised in as many subjects as possible. The main targets of these seminars were the learners. Nevertheless, almost all the teachers of the College as well as students and teachers from neighbouring academic institutions also actively participated in the seminars.
- As many as seven seminars were held by the IQAC in the session 2015-2016.

• The IQAC proposed in its meeting that a research journal should be published by the College and a **Research & Journal Committee** was thus formed for the purpose. As a result the College published an international peer reviewed double blind online and print journal in late 2015 called *International Journal Of Research on Social & Natural Sciences*.

6.5.2 The institution reviews its teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals through IQAC set up as per norms

Response:

- The IQAC of the College is ever watchful of the various needs regarding the teaching learning process. It therefore, strives to bring reforms that would benefit the learners.
- It was with this view in mind that the IQAC facilitated the building of a smart class room for day to day classes as well as to hold seminars. The College already had projectors, laptops and screens for initiating ICT induced learning. However, the IQAC felt that it was very important to dedicate a separate room for the purpose. The College intends to build more ICT rooms in the future for use of the students.
- The number of permanent teaching faculty and non-teaching staff steadily decreased with the retirement of many of them and this made the smooth running of the College difficult. The IQAC took serious interest in this issue and requested the authority of the Institution to take some immediate measures in the matter. The Principal took two steps to manage the problem of declining teacher-student ratio. He appointed guest lecturers to tide over the situation immediately and also took great initiatives to solve the problems of the Hundred Point Roster and sent requisition for 26 teaching staff for day section, 7 teaching staff for B.Ed section and 1 librarian for morning library to the West Bengal College service Commission. The College has already received 16 full time staff and 1 librarian during the session 2016-2017. The problem of scarcity of non-teaching staff has been met by appointing Group C and Group D staff on ad-hoc basis.

6.5.5 Incremental improvements made during the preceding five years (in case of first cycle) Post accreditation quality initiatives (second and subsequent cycles)

The College has faced NAAC visit in 2007 and the College has come a long way after that. The College has pondered on various observation made by the Peer Team and concern expressed by them on certain areas, and has taken steps regarding them. The following are the measures that have been initiated by the College –

- The administrative office has been fully computerized with printing and photocopying facilities.
- A separate computer room with Internet and printing facilities has been set up for the exclusive use of the faculty.
- A computer has been installed in the Students' Union Room for use of the students.
- Wi-fi has been set up in the Administrative Office and Staff Room. Internet facility has been added to all computers/laptops available in the College.
- At present the College has set up one ICT Room for lectures and seminars.
- Computer laboratory has been set up for Mathematics and Commerce departments.
- Self-financing has been withdrawn from the two courses Geography and Sanskrit from 2010-2011 session. Since then these subjects have become part of the regular course.
- Remedial Coaching has been conducted for slow learners.
- The College Library has become a member of the N-List programme and has access to INFLIBNET.
- KOHA software has been installed for modernization of the Library.
- A noise-free generator of 65 KVA has been installed for uninterrupted power supply throughout the day.
- Purifier-cum-chillers have been provided in various areas of the College for providing safe drinking water to the students and the staff.
- The old multi-gymnasium has been replaced by a new one very recently.
- CCTV cameras have been installed in the College for better surveillance and security.
- Renovations have been made in laboratories of different departments and the Students' Union Room.
- Electrical wiring of the Chemistry department has been changed for safety reasons and exhaust fans have been installed in the laboratory.
- Boundary walls have been constructed around the Boys' Hostel and the Sports ground.
- The College tried earnestly to introduce a course on Communicative English for the learners and the Principal contacted an organization called Cambridge School of Spoken English, Durgapur. However, the Governing Body discarded their proposal since it was found to be too expensive for the students of this College. Then the GB decided to appoint a competent guest teacher for the purpose and it was advertised for twice. No applicants were found in response to either of the advertisements. The Principal contacted DESIG International for a demonstration in the College and decided to enter into a legal agreement with the organization. Later on, the organization was not interested any more in opening Communicative English course in Katwa College. Thus, the College has not been able to start the course in spite of best efforts.

- The College has an Internal Complaints Committee headed by a lady teacher and a Grievance Redressal Cell which may be used by the girl students when required.
- The Institution has security personnels watching over the campus round the clock. There are CCTV cameras as well to keep a vigil on the campus.
- The authority of the College and all staff both teaching and non-teaching are extremely sensitive towards the needs of the girl students.
- The College also has a separate hostel for girl students with a night security personnel.
- The College does not have a counseling cell for the girl students at the moment. However, the girl students informally approach the lady teachers with problems and the latter try to help the students in whatever way possible.
- The Institution has a separate common room for girls with a lady attendant.
- The female staff is represented in various committees serving the College.
- Representation of girls in the Students' Union is 31%.
- The College provides all possible help to the girl students who receive *Kanyashree* scholarship. Under the initiative of the principal a Kanyashree Club, headed by a teaching staff, has been formed

for conducting cultural activities with the receivers of the scholarship.

• A Gender Sensitization cell has been recently set up, headed by female faculties, for students, under the aegis of the IQAC Coordinator.

• The College is very conscious about proper disposal of all kinds of wastes. The College has a vat

inside the campus where the solid waste generated is deposited and it is periodically collected by Katwa Municipality. The liquid waste primarily from the Department of Chemistry goes to a soak pit set up inside the campus which is connected to the Municipality sewerage system. The College is trying to be plastic-free and a resolution with regard to this was taken up in the Teachers' Council.

In 2016 a Seminar and Motivation Programme was held to observe 'National Youth Day', Birth centenary of Swami Vivekananda and later in the year the college participated in a programme organized by Gushkara College to mark 75 years of Netaji's Great Escape.
- In January 2017, A Seminar and Motivation Programme was held to mark Netaji's Birthday.
- Apart from the College Republic Day celebration, the Institution also extends participation in the parade programme arranged by the S.D.O Katwa, Government of West Bengal.

- There is a finance committee in the college which is approved by the Governing Body of the college to verify all the matters relating to income and expenditure of the college. It comprises six members and is headed by the convener who is also the Bursar of the college. In addition there are purchase committee and building committee which also maintain strict vigil over the expenditure against purchase and procurement of materials needed for different infrastrctural developments of the college.
- The college has a democratically formed Teachers' Council which deliberates over the academic issues and gives suggestions for implementations of their respective recomendations to the Academic Committee which again sort lists the priority areas and in turn sends them to the apex body through the Principal of the college. Further regular meetings between the Principal and the departmental committees strengthen the entire process and whenever required, departments hold meetings with parents. Internal assessments and class tests are regularly held and the students' progression in their academic pursuit are intensely monitored. The college has Grivence Redressal Cell and also an Anti-Ragging cell along with an Internal Complaints Committee (against sexual harassment of women in workplace which keep strict vigil over the various functions in the college and adopts an intolerant approach towards any such delinquency).
- The administration of the college is headed by the G.B. which is constituted as per statutes laid by the University of Burdwan and also the Higer Education Department of the Govt. of West Bengal. The Principal is the chief administrator of the college and secretary of the G.B. The internal administration is headed by the Principal who is regularly assisted by the different sub-committes formed under the aegis of the Principal Admistrative body i.e. the G.B. The Students' Union works fully in unison with the Principal and the internal Committes.
- Along with imparting curricular education the college takes pains to inject enthusiasism among the students to participate in different co-curricular and extra curricular activities.
- The Students are encouraged on regular basis to participate in programmes both inside and outside

the college like Youth Parliament, Mock Parliament, Photography Exhibitions, Quiz Competitions, Poster Competitions, NSS activities, NCC camps, both annual and special. Student teams are patronised and sponsored on regular basis to participate in all the sports competitions both indoor and outdoor and also in athletic meets organised by the University and the State Govt. as well. The College cricket team regularly participates in the sub-divisional cricket tournament alongside with the University tournament and the Football, Kabadi (both Boys and Girls) and Athletic team (both Boys and Girls) participate regularly in the annual athletic and football tournament organised by the D.P.I. West Bengal.

2. Objectives of the Practice

- (i) The prime object of publishing the journal was to encourage the faculties, become keener towards research and to set up a relationship with scholars outside the College.
- (ii) A major objective is to prepare students as responsible citizens along with academic development.

3. The Context

- (i) In a meeting of IQAC held on 18.08.2015, the Principal proposed publication of online research journal from the College. A Research and Journal Sub-Committee was formed in the Teachers' Council for the same. The IQAC Coordinator met the joint editors of the journal, and the resolution of publishing a Biannual Double Blind Peer-Reviewed Online and print Journal was taken with the name *International Journal of Research On Social and Natural Sciences* (IJRSNS). It was also decided that the College would apply for ISSN after two issues. The proposal was sent to the Governing Body for ratification which was granted and the first issue was released in December 2015. After one issue, the college appealed for ISSN which it received in 2016. At present, the journal is on its way to the sixth release with ISSN 2455-5916 (Online).
- (ii) NSS units of the College initially organized one blood donation camp every year. The College started Blood Donation Motivation Course for its NSS volunteers. This course helped students to understand the importance of blood donation and the donation per unit has been increasing in the College thereafter.

4. The Practice

- (i) **IJRSNS** is a double blind peer reviewed journal published biannually by Katwa College, WB, India in June and December every year. It is an open access online journal with no submission as well as publication fees and UGC approved.
- (ii) The Blood Donation Course involves 16 classes by resource persons from West Bengal Voluntary Blood Donors' Association, blood donation

by volunteers organised by the College and a one day examination. The volunteers receive a certificate after completing the Course.

5. Evidence of Success

- (i) Starting from its venture in December, 2015, the College did not face any problem in getting articles on different disciplines for possible publication. The strong editorial advisory board always cooperates with the joint editors while reviewing the manuscripts. Most of the articles come from researchers outside the Institution publishing the journal.
- (ii) Blood Donation Motivation Course has motivated numerous students to participate in blood donation and there has been a steady increase in

their numbers over the years. All blood units are collected by Hemraj Blood Bank of Katwa Sub-divisional Hospital.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

- (i) Usually no problems are faced in carrying out the academic programme since the College authority extends all possible help for publication.
- (ii) The College suffers from shortage of space. Therefore, the reading room of the Central Library is usually procured for holding blood

donation camps.

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 Describe/Explain the performance of the institution in one area distinctive to its vision, priority and thrust

Response:

• Empowerment of women is the need of the day and the College has a vision to accomplish this by spreading education among the girls. The College has a separate section, i.e. the Morning Section, dedicated specially for female learners. Female students who want to pursue General Course in Humanities are catered to in this section. Female learners aspiring to pursue Honours Course in Humanities, Science and Commerce are admitted to the Day section of the Institution. There is a considerable minority population in the neighbouring districts of Burdwan, Birbhoom, Nadia and

Murshidabad. The College tries to attract students from the minority community as far as possible. This is more important in the case of girls from the minority coming from comparatively conservative background, who are admitted to the Morning section of the College.

- Special care is taken so that *Kanyashre*e, a special governmental scholarship for girl students of the state of West Bengal is applied for and reaches the female students of the College in time.
- The College has a separate common room with a lady attendant exclusively for the girl students. The Institution also has a separate hostel for girls where female students coming from distant places can be accommodated at a cheap cost. The hostel has a male security for night time watch.
- The Institution has an Internal Complaints Committee which may be taken advantage of by the girl students in case of gender discrepancy. Fortunately no such case has been reported yet among female learners.

- In case of all these three, it must be kept in mind that the College, being situated in a predominantly rural environment, faces a barrage of obstacles in different forms. Had it been placed in a better or more urban setting the inputs against the Metric No/s could well have been more positive and different.

Concluding Remarks:

- The College, since its inception, has been striving for advancement of learning. The Institution has tried to accommodate first generation learners, students from low economic background, girl students from conservative families, diverse communities for empowerment through education, values and culture.
- The College has ventured to serve the society through its extension activities like adoption of villages, organisation of blood donation camps, rallies for socio-cultural awareness and other eco-friendly measures.
- The College caters to a conspicuous mass of learners. It is the only College in the sub-division which offers as many as six Science subjects. It also successfully runs a B.Ed. section and is a study centre to two distance education programmes.
- The College serves students from remote areas by providing hostel facilities for both boys and girls. The College has a spacious campus and own sports ground which serves the Institution and the community alike.
- The present challenge for the College is starting a course in Communicative English and the authority will focus on rectifying it.
- Improvement is a continuous process and the College will ever strive for higher excellence in academic, administrative and auxiliary functions.
