KATWA COLLEGE

Katwa College, a semi-rural college located in Purba Bardhaman, West Bengal, is committed to the vision of imparting education to its students that is comprehensive, innovative and entrepreneurial. The institutional distinctiveness of this college lies in the fact that it is consistently striving towards opening up post graduate course and new under graduate courses for its students. The College has a separate section, i.e. the Morning Section, dedicated specially for female learners. Female students who want to pursue General Course in Humanities are catered to in this section. Female learners aspiring to pursue Honours Course in Humanities, Science and Commerce are admitted to the Day section. This is more important in the case of girls from the minority coming from comparatively conservative background, who take admission in the Morning section of the College. Special care is taken so that *Kanyashree*, a special governmental scholarship for girl students of the state of West Bengal is applied for and reaches the female students of the College in time. The College has a separate common room with a lady attendant exclusively for the girl students. The Institution also has a girl's hostel where female students coming from distant places can be accommodated at a cheap cost.

VISION:

The Vision of the College gradually changed with time, especially with spreading literacy mission all over west Bengal. The College tries to attract students from the minority community as far as possible. This is more important in the case of girls from the minority, who are admitted to the Morning Section of the College which exclusively serves girls. The College endeavors to inculcate communal harmony among the learners by convening Saraswati Puja as well as observing Navi Dibas.

The College adopts an inclusive approach through expanding the scope of education to farther areas beyond the immediate rural belt surrounding the townships. Thus the College ventured to accommodate students from as many as the four districts, to acknowledge the collective aspiration of the prospective students from this rural belt for social identity. Simultaneously the College allows special assistance to the SC/St and minority students.

The rise in the numbers of the first-generation learners became a salient feature in the rural belt mentioned earlier. This resulted in continual rise in the intake of students in the College. The College was doing its best to cater higher education to this increasing mass of aspiring students.

The mission of college is 'Advancement of Learning' – the method followed to achieve the supreme good for oneself. Here in this college, the goal is to serve the students, mostly as they are, coming from economically, socially and educationally constrained circumstances by providing them quality education by:

- (ii) To establish the college as a potential centre of research activities thus creating a strong tradition of deep-rooted academic culture and an ambiance that favours the scholarly activities of the faculty.

CRITERIO VI - INSTITUTIONAL VALUES AND BEST PRACTICES

Best Practice -1

1. Title of the practice:

Advanced students taking classes of junior semesters under guidance of departmental teachers

2. Objective of the practice:

To motivate students to prepare a topic well enough to take a class on it and also building up their confidence, ability to express themselves on a subject matter and handle a class situation. It is also meant to encourage junior students to prepare themselves well so that they can also take such classes in future semesters.

3. The context:

In the IQAC meeting held on 11.12.2020 and ratified in the meeting of all HoDs along with IQAC held on 12.04.2022 it was decided to introduce the practice of encouraging select senior semester students to take classes of junior semester students once in a while in order make them practice preparing and teaching a certain topic under the guidance and watchful eyes of the departmental teachers.

The challenge was in getting the practice started on a regular and sustainable basis and also in motivating the students in participating enthusiastically in the experiment. Being a semi-urban college where a large proportion of the students come from a rural background it is often difficult to get the students to express themselves and speak confidently on a topic without encumbrances. Even advanced and meritorious students are often diffident in verbal expression. It is a challenge for the teachers to overcome this problem and encourage the students to participate enthusiastically.

4. The practice:

In the first three months five departments have already implemented this practice as a pilot project. The Departments of Chemistry, English, Bengali, Sanskrit and Geography have held classes by senior students and a total of 7 classes have been taken by 230 students. The Departments maintain a record of the classes taken by a student along with the topic discussed. In the coming semester it will be implemented in all departments and the experience of the students and teachers in this regard will be collated and documented.

The uniqueness of this practice lies in the fact that it is not part of the regular mandatory academic practices and is something out of the regular routine and also contains an element of innovation and newness for the students. It has the potential of introducing a new element in the teaching-learning process.

5. Evidence of success:

The practice has been started experimentally in five departments and has met with success so far. The students selected for taking the first classes have successfully taken the classes on the topics decided jointly by the teachers and the students concerned, and the students taught have also participated wholeheartedly in the classes. The teachers have taken the initiative to identify advanced students who can profitably take such classes and guided them to prepare themselves well for the classes. Thus the departmental teachers have taken it as a challenge to overcome apathy and diffidence on the part of the students and motivate them for the same.

We hope that this practice will result in developing better understanding of the topic by the students taking the classes and also develop his or her confidence, poise and ability to explain a topic and handle a class. It will also motivate the students of the junior semester and serve as a role model for them to advance in their studies.

6. Problems encountered and resources required:

The main problem in implementation of this practice is the apathy and diffidence on the part of

even the advanced who are not used to this practice and who are not used to speaking in

public. The implementation of this practice does not require any extra resources but motivation

on the part of the departmental teachers as well as students to make the experiment a success.

Best Practice -2

1.Title of the Practice: Medical Unit

1. Objectives of the Practice:

The objective of the practice is to set up a medical unit on campus which can treat both

the stakeholders of Katwa College as well as the neighbouring residents in case of any

first aid requirement or emergency oxygen requirement. It is was set up in the context of

the Covid-19 epidemic when the country was in the situation of lockdown and shortage

of required oxygen was reported from many places. So that the students, teachers and

staff of Katwa College as well as the neighbourhood residents do not suffer from an

oxygen shortage it was decided that the College would set up a medical unit with

contribution from the College fund as well as all employees of the College both teaching

and non-teaching.

2. The Context:

The context was the widespread oxygen requirement and reporting of shortages in

various places during the second wave of Covid-19. The employees of the College

including teaching and non-teaching came together in an online meeting at the initiative

of the College Principal to discuss the situation and what initiatives the College and its

employees could take in this situation to benefit the community as a whole. It was

decided that the employees would contribute along with the College in setting up a

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medical unit which would deal with a basic medical emergency and also keep oxygen cylinders for emergency requirement.

3. The Practice:

In accordance with this decision as ratified by the College Governing Body on 10.08.2021 a Medical Unit named Arogya was inaugurated on 29.03.2022 by the SDO, Katwa and President, Katwa College Governing Body.

with the following equipments used for the purposes described:

1. Height cum weight measuring scale: Measuring Height and Weight.

2. Weighting scale: measuring body Weight.

3. Pulse oxymetre: Evaluation of Oxygen saturation and pulse best.

4. Stethoscope: measuring heart beat and respiration rate

5. Sphygmomanometer: Measuring blood pressure

6. Digital thermometer: Measuring body temperature

7. Resuscitator: Devise for artificial breathing

8. Instrument set for dressing: Wound

9. Instrument set for sutures: stitching cut and Wound

10. Instrument set for removing sutures: cutting the stitching after healing

11. Stitch removing scissor: stitching purpose

12. Straight scissor: stitching purpose

13. Suction machine: Removing of cough and mucus from respiratory organs.

14. Waste bean with cover

15. Dressing forcep: Dressing instrument

16. Stainless tray: Tray for keeping instrument.

17. Gallipods: Enameled tray for keeping instrument

18. Infusion stand: Stand for saline Infusion

19. Portable sanitizing machine: Sanitizer for instrument

20. Oxygen cylinder – 2 nos.

21. ECG machine

The College has also allotted a separate room where outside patients can also come and avail of the treatment. The Katwa Municipality has also agreed to provide some basic medications on free basis which can be given to the patients. Also two experienced female personnel have been employed by the College on casual basis to administer first aid and use the equipment for any patients and medical unit Arogya is open on all working days from 10 AM to 4 PM.

4. Evidence of Success:

The medical personnel have been on call for any medical emergency faced by any student, teacher or staff of the college and have successfully administered first aid in case of any emergency, monitored blood pressure, pulse and oxygen saturation levels etc.

5. Problems encountered and resources required:

The main problem in implementing such an ambitious project at the level of a College lay in the financial outlay involved in procuring expensive equipment as well as oxygen cylinders and in employing the required staff. It would also be beneficial in future if any physician or trained nurse could be present at the medical unit at a particular time every week. The financial constraint was met by a contribution of Rupees One Lakh from the

	College fund and was contributed by the College employees from their salaries. The					
	College plans to expand the facilities offered and the instruments available as well as make available the services of trained medical personnel in future.
